Our State Reptile, the Snapping Turtle

This time of year many, people are seeing snapping turtles digging in their yards or swimming in home ponds. Snapping turtles and other turtles make their nests in easily dug soil, so l they may lay their eggs in



backyards and gardens. If the nest can be allowed to remain, hatchlings will emerge in August or September but sometimes overwintering until spring. If the area where the nest has been laid must be disturbed, contact your regional wildlife office for guidance.

Snapping turtles (Chelydra Serpentina) are often described as aggressive, but a better term is defensive. They try to avoid confrontation and are more likely to defend themselves on dry land. When they are on land, try to give them some extra space, and they will move on. In fact, if you see one on land it is usually a female who is looking to lay eggs. Snappers spend most of their lives in the water, where they will generally swim away from people when encountered and are usually docile.

Unfortunately, like many turtle species, snapping turtles face serious threats - being struck while crossing roads or collection for the food and pet trade. It is illegal to collect or relocate a snapping turtle without a permit.

Nuisance Wildlife Within the Campground:

We have had some reports of groundhogs, skunks, raccoons, and a few others. We stay in a campground and a part of enjoying nature is coexisting with nature. Here is an article recently published by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation posted in their most recent newsletter - help do your part to keep some of these undesirable guests away:

Wildlife, Fish & Marine Life Newsletter R.E.P.E.L. Nuisance Wildlife

Springtime can coincide with an increase in conflicts between people and wildlife. Woodchucks in the garden, squirrels or other critters in the attic, and skunks under the shed are but a few of the problems people may encounter. The best way to reduce common wildlife issues is by eliminating access to food, water, and shelter. Here are some tips to help you REPEL or prevent and control problems with wild animals:

- Remove food sources do not feed wildlife, remove all feeders and suet in the spring and summer, do not store garbage outside, and bring it to the dumpsters immediately. Feed pets indoors.
- Eliminate cover and shelter close to homes and buildings - get rid of piles of brush, logs, and junk, and stash firewood away from your house or other buildings; mow tall grass near houses or other buildings.
- Put up barriers use chimney covers and soffit vents, fence in areas such as gardens and underneath decks, and seal entry holes that lead into the house.
- Excite or agitate use visual repellents such as scarecrows or lights, or create noise by yelling or using noisemakers (be sure to check noise ordinances in your area).
- Legally remove or "take" contact a licensed Nuisance Wildlife Control Operator to remove problem wildlife from your property or remove or "take" nuisance animals on your own in accordance to New York State laws and regulations.

Blue Haven Campground Policy Reminders:

We have a lot of new families in the park this season. We want to remind everyone of a few of our policies here within the park. These guidelines have been set to ensure the SAFETY and ENJOY-MENT of ALL of our guests while at Blue Haven. We all need to follow them and here are just a few reminders:

GOLF CART POLICY

Operating Golf Carts in the Campground is a PRIVILEGE.

- Absolutely no gas powered golf carts, only electric powered are permitted.
- One cart is allowed per site and it must be registered with the Campground.
- You will be assigned a cart number and you are required to display that number as follows:
 - Numbers must be at least 3" high in a contrasting color
 - Displayed on two opposite sides (front/back OR side/side)
- There is a \$45 annual registration fee.
- NO SPEEDING The speed limit is 5mph for EVERY vehicle within the park.
- Golf Carts MUST be limited to the number of passengers the cart is designed to carry.
- NO ONE UNDER 16 YEARS OF AGE ARE ALLOWED TO DRIVE THE CART
- Golf Cart Chargers draw a significant amount of power, so please unplug your chargers when not in use, and especially in high electric use times.
- Golf Carts MUST have headlights and tail lights to operate at night.

There will be consequences for those who do not follow the guidelines above.

We will take the following action(s) when necessary:

- 1st Offense: A warning will be issued.
- 2nd Offense: The Golf Cart will be grounded to your site for one (1) month.
- 3rd Offense: The Golf Cart will need to be removed from the Campground.
- NO EXCEPTIONS

Our team will be making sure that everyone is following the rules. For more information, please refer to page 22 of the Policy Handbook.

SPEED LIMIT:

- Speed limit throughout the park is 5MPH
- This applies to all vehicles, automobiles, golf carts, and bicycles
- This is for everyone's safety

Neighborhood Site Watch:

We are fortunate that this is NOT simply a campground, but a thriving Community. Please keep in mind some of the following and PLEASE share these with your younger Community Members:

- Please be respectful to other camper's sites:
 - Do not pass through someone else's site while walking, biking, with a golf cart.
 - Do not park on other's sites
- Please help out by keeping an eye on other sites and campers for other families while they are not here. If you see anything unusual around their site such as an open door, window, or storage shed, Please let the office know.
- If you see someone around a site you feel shouldn't be there, call the office so we can handle the issue.
- If you see something Say ay something. This will only strengthen our Community while making families know they are safe while they are in the park and that their belongings are safe when they are not here.

Site Payments are PAST DUE

With June 1st behind us, we still have a considerable amount of 6 guests that have not paid for their sites in full for 2021. Please make arrangements to get this caught up.

It is not fair to the others that pay on time, not to mention there is added interest charges. Just as a reminder, here is a snip of the relevant payment information from the Policy Handbook outlining our site payment policy:

Late Fees

All site rent is to be paid in full by June 1st. This applies to all payment plans. If the site is NOT paid in full by June 1st, a late fee will apply, along with out standard missed payment fees/interest.

Anyone who does NOT pay their site rent in full by June 1st for TWO (2) consecutive seasons, will see an increase in their seasonal

site rent until paid on time.

2% interest of the unpaid site balance, will be charged to your account, on all contracts not paid by June 1st. Contracts and fees will continue to accrue interest monthly until the account is current.
